Edward Mills provided a fascinating walk around the woods, and then on the Tuesday we received end of apprenticeship presentations from Helen Elvin and Rupert Hoskinson, showing how varied the BHMAT experience can be, and showing off some of their excellent products. Rupert also gave an account of his other 3 year apprenticeship in stand-up comedy! Edward Acland stormed through a presentation on "Gaurdening" (or gardening with a "U"!).

Apprentice Update

Helen Elvin is about to complete her apprenticeship with Martin Clark and is ready to pursue her own business in NW Cumbria. She has bought her own wood this year which will make a great base for a workshop.

Rupert Hoskinson is about to complete his apprenticeship at Holker Hall. He has been sponsored by Tony Saunders and they are looking into offering training for the Field Studies Council and also for pupils at Witherslack School. He has bought a small kiln and will continue to work the woods at Holker.

Both Rupert and Helen gave their 3rd year presentations at Woodland Pioneers in September this year – they were both excellent advertisements for the apprenticeship and were informative, entertaining and had on show some beautiful products – well done to both of them!

Andy Parkes has withdrawn from the apprenticeship. He completed his first year and so gained a first year certificate from OCNW.

Mike Carswell, sponsored by Rebecca Oaks, is in his second year. He remains committed to his home base in Manchester and has made some very useful contacts there with urban woodland parks, with the intention of establishing himself with a firewood/charcoal/coppice business once he completes his apprenticeship. He gave a very interesting talk on Urban Coppicing to CANW recently.

Peter Wood is in his second year and is apprenticed to BHMAT Trustee Maurice Pyle, based in the North East. He is already working independently much of the time and is building a solid base for his business.

Tessa Rhodes is sponsored by Ruth Thompson and works all around the NE. She started off self funding but following new funding we were able to offer her the BHMAT bursary, so now she is receiving the same support as other apprentices.

Sam Ansell is in his first year and is apprenticed to Rebecca Oaks. Keen and enthusiastic, he is considering taking on the contract to coppice Moss and Height Spring which is owned by the Woodland Trust and situated in the Rusland Valley.
